Episode 1: Foreigners in their Own Land (1565-1880)
Manifest Destiny pushes the U.S into the Mexican territories of the South West. 54 mins.

Episode 2: Empire of Dreams (1880-1942)

The U.S. seizes Puerto Rico in the Spanish American War. Latinos are deported en masse during the Great Depression. 55 mins.

Episode 3: War and Peace (1942-1954)

Service during the war allows Latinos to make unprecedented gains in civil rights, but the journey is far from over. 55 mins.

Episode 6: Peril and Promise (1980-2000)

Thousands of Salvadorans, Nicaraguans and Guatemalans flee civil wars, death squads and unrest, transforming the US along the way. 55 mins.
